

## Ten Things You Need To Know About the Kern Community College District Measure J

- Kern Community College District's (KCCD) Measure J, if approved by the voters, will fund \$502.8 Million capital projects across three colleges, Bakersfield College (BC), Cerro Coso Community College and Porterville College.
- 2. The BC main campus, the largest campus in KCCD, is now serving over 20,000 students in impacted and outdated classrooms constructed in the mid-1950s with an original enrollment of 1,300.
- KCCD bond funds are necessary to modernize, repair and construct facilities that can accommodate the needs of students in 2016 and beyond. To see a full list of KCCD projects across the three colleges, go to www.kccd.edu/business-services/frequently-askedquestions-answers.
- 4. The KCCD bond will fund necessary modernization of the college and expansion of its footprint, both at BC and in outlying communities (e.g., Arvin and Delano communities). Projects on the needs list include:
  - Construct Veterans Resource Centers (Panorama and Delano Campuses).
  - Construct/replace Science & Engineering Building.
  - Construct new Agriculture Center.
  - Renovate Memorial Stadium, Gymnasium and Athletic Facilities.
  - Modernize Fine Arts Building, Humanities Building, Language Arts Building, Family & Consumer Education Building.

- Modernize and expand building for Student Support Services.
- Construct new Learning Facility in Arvin/Lamont/Greenfield Community.
- Improve technology infrastructure throughout all facilities.
- 5. Funds are needed to upgrade and expand the Veteran Resource Centers. Kern Community College District serves thousands of military veterans each year, many of whom face challenges re-entering college and civilian life.
- 6. The measure passage requires 55% of registered voters who live in the KCCD.
- If voters approve the bond measure, money generated from the subsequent sale of these bonds can only be used on the projects listed in the KCCD bond resolution.
- 8. The measure will require citizen oversight and yearly audits to ensure that all funds are used locally, effectively, and as promised.
- 9. KCCD has been working with local community members to determine the best rate level for the bond structure. If approved by voters, the rate levied to meet bond requirements will not exceed Prop 39 amounts of \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed property value.
- 10. Kern Community College District bond measure has been placed on the ballot for November 8<sup>th</sup> as Measure J.

- ✓ DO provide objective, factual information about college facilities needs and make available published documents such as the resolution or other factual information.
- ✓ DO make informational presentations to community organizations and stakeholders about College facility needs, during any time of the day.
- ✓ DO answer questions from residents with factual information.
- ✓ **DO** refer constituents to the District's website as needed for information.

**YOU CAN VOLUNTEER** for advocacy activities of your choice, but only during non-working hours (when off-duty) using non-College District equipment (personal phones/personal fax/personal email).

- DO NOT use College District resources of any nature, such as college facilities, funds, time while working at the College District, District email addresses, District phones, faxes, supplies or copies, for advocacy.
- **DO NOT** say that you are "representing" the College District in a partisan position.
- DO NOT require or request that colleagues participate in a partisan campaign during your District work time, or when representing the College District.
- DO NOT urge passage or defeat of a Measure during work hours or at College District expense.
