Accreditation reaffirmed for the next seven years

Dear Colleagues:

We just received the official word from ACCJC!

Bakersfield College's accreditation has been **reaffirmed for the next seven years**. There were **no compliance Recommendations**. There were **no improvement Recommendations**. Further, the college received three Commendations and the District one Commendation. It is a good time to be at BC! We are BC!

The full accreditation report for Bakersfield College is available to the public and is posted on the College's website at www.bakersfieldcollege.edu/accreditation.

The College has earned its Commendations for (1) exceptional leadership and active engagement to advance student learning and achievement, (2) proactive outreach to and support of its students in the rural portions of its service area, including the communities of McFarland, Arvin, Wasco, Shafter, and Delano, and (3) exemplary and multifaceted professional development initiatives to lift all members of the BC Community through shared and inclusive learning. The one District Commendation is to commend the Kern Community College District for its establishment of fiscal stability and financial transparency. The exact language is:

Commendation 1: The team commends the College for its exceptional leadership and active engagement to advance student learning and achievement as indicated through the work of governance committees such as Program Review, College Council, Accreditation and Institutional Quality; institutional reports including Closing the Loop and State of the College; and adopting the Guided Pathways framework with intentional outreach to high schools, creating completion coaching teams, and using data coaches to support student success. This is the result of institutional leaders creating an empowering environment to drive innovation. (I.B.4, II.A.7, II.C.5, II.C.6, IV.A.I)

Commendation 2: The team commends the College for its commitment to mission as exemplified by its proactive outreach to and support of its students in the rural portions of its 5,000 square-mile service area, including the communities of McFarland, Arvin,


Wasco, Shafter, and Delano, through the Rural Initiatives program. The College's efforts to partner with these and other rural Kern County communities to offer classes and support services at remote sites has helped create the foundation for a college-going culture throughout the Bakersfield College service area. (II.A.I, II.C.3)

Commendation 3: The team commends the College for its commitment to capacity building of all members of the Bakersfield College community. This core value of shared and inclusive learning is evidenced by exemplary and multifaceted professional development initiatives, including locally-created Title IX training videos for students, "scholarships" for employee attendance at external conferences, and providing real-time and on-demand streamed workshops and events ensuring maximum accessibility and participation by all constituency groups. District Commendation 1: The teams commend the District for establishing and maintaining a culture of fiscal stability as evidenced by unmodified audit reports, funds earmarked toward known liabilities, substantial reserves, clearly defined plans to address potential future uncertainties, and a high degree of financial transparency. With the establishment of the District-wide Budget Committee, the District has demonstrated its commitment to collaborative decision-making and continuous improvement. (III.D.1, III.D.9)

This is no coincidence. This reaffirmation and these Commendations are a direct result of your leadership and engagement to the heartfelt work that we do on this campus. Each and every day, we actively choose to see every student as an important part of our own existence, an important part of our purpose and story, incorporating them into our one unified Renegade tradition of excellence.

A Look Back at the Accreditation Process:

Over 200 faculty, staff, administrators, and students engaged on writing teams, in open forums, and through our campus-wide committees.

The work began in spring 2016, with BC writing teams organizing around the standards. In spring 2017, we launched the full ISER writing process at opening day. From there, in retreats, small group meetings, and lab settings, our writing teams engaged in the detailed work to respond to the standards. Faculty, staff, and administrators alike contributed to the early draft documents and collection of

evidence. Throughout summer and fall 2017, these teams held campus-wide forums, updated our websites, and refined their writing before shipping it off to our editing team.

In fall 2017 and spring 2018, our editing team, led by the indomitable Nick Strobel, began his work to share BC's story in a single voice. Through countless hours and many, many late nights, Nick carefully wove the fabric of our ISER. After a detailed – and I mean excruciatingly



detailed – edit, we revealed the ISER at College Council in May at the Delano campus.

Once the Board of Trustees approved the document in July, we immediately switched gears into campus-wide engagement in the way we do at BC: at 150%. Committees, departments, student organizations, and more did deep reads of the Institutional Self-Evaluation Report, identifying their points of pride as described in our report.

On October 4, 2018, over 100 BC faculty and staff gathered in the Fireside Room, in Delano, and in offices across all of our campuses to celebrate the closing of this historic chapter of our history.



Emcee Todd Coston got the party started right as our evaluation team departed. Our catering team ensured we were well fed as we reflected on the 18-month journey to our reaffirmation. We celebrated the leadership that shepherded this important work, spending thousands of hours collectively to research, write, collect and index evidence, engage the campus community in the content of the ISER, interview with the evaluators... and so much more.
